## Answers to Questions left in chat

Do you have a sand mixture you'd recommend that would allow native plants from the Prairie to grow in this area?	I have not personally attempted to grow sand prairie plants in a non-sand prairie setting. At the Cape Girardeau Conservation Nature Center, we have a mock sand prairie where a large amount of sand was introduced, and we have been able to grow some of the prairie plants you would see at the sand prairie. Plants like split-beard bluestem, prickly pear cactus, partridge pea, smooth spiderwort, and others have done well here.
Are there certain native plants from the prairie that do well in pots?	I also have not attempted to grow sand prairie plants in a pot. I have successfully germinated split-beard bluestem seeds in a pot with sandy soil but have not attempted to keep it year-round in a pot.

Are there major differences between the sand prairie in Kansas and the Missouri Sand Prairie?

Unfortunately, I have not had the pleasure of visiting a sand prairie in Kansas so I cannot speak to the differences. However, I would assume if the prairie were classified as a sand prairie natural community there would be similarities.
